President – out and about

Since NM June many issues have been impacting Nareburn.

The release of the Willoughby Local Environmental Plan 2012 to guide development over the next 20 years; it provides the statutory framework for all planning, development and building; it outlines zoning types and development restrictions for land, and aims to conserve local heritage and protect sensitive land. There have been some changes particularly around the Nareburn shops area.

At our NPA August General Meeting several concerned residents attended to voice their dissatisfaction regarding additions to an existing dwelling, additions that will impact the streets in which they live. All joined the NPA and wanted other residents to be aware that changes to State Planning Laws mean that the DA process of Council notifying nearby residents can be replaced by the applicant using a private certifier – no notification ahead of approval. Unfortunately the NPA is unable to do much about this current process except to advise our members. We need to ensure that the current character of our suburb is maintained. It is therefore essential that we as residents band together. If you are not an NPA member please consider joining us, so that we can become a united force to preserve our suburb. The NPA will continue to keep a watching brief on development applications in Nareburn.

National Tree Day occurred on the last weekend in July. Tree planting in Nareburn was led by Ronan Ahern of Northcote Street and Jean O'Neill from Council. Trees were planted in Martin and Francis Streets with residents joining in. It was appropriate that the plantings took place following the regulation 'pruning' of many street trees the previous weekend and ahead of the August winds. For several years WCC has ensured that street tree planting will not interfere with power lines – for more information visit www.willoughby.nsw.gov.au/your-neighbourhood/trees/

On Saturday 8 September Local Government Elections take place. I thank our current Nareburn Ward Councillors for their support and help, in particular the NPA thanks Councillors Kate Lamb and Barry Thompson who are stepping down after many years of service on behalf of Nareburn Ward. It is our intention to collaborate with the Artarmon Progress Association for a 'Meet the Candidates' evening at the new Artarmon Library on the corner of Tindale and Artarmon Roads on Wednesday 29 August at 7:00 pm.

The Willoughby Spring Festival will 'Burst Into Life' in September. Various activities will take place throughout the month with the main feature being the StreetFair on Saturday 15 September in the Chatswood CBD. Nareburn Community Centre Open Day is on Saturday 1 September. We look forward to seeing you there!

Finally I thank Trisha FitzPatrick who is resigning from her roles within the NPA – Public Officer, Website Coordinator and very significantly, Editor of *Nareburn Matters*.

Trisha's contribution has been wide-reaching; she has shown great commitment in performing her NPA roles despite facing adversity in her health. She says that even though she loves editing *Nareburn Matters* that her cancer/surgery/chemo was a wake-up call for her to get on with her 'bucket list'. The NPA is so grateful to you Trisha for your contributions to our Association over more than seven years. We wish you well.

Community Garden – Spring 2012

Many things have happened in and around the garden.

The group won Project Local, a prize of \$2,500 to get things started. We have also had fantastic support from Council, who have provided the wood, soil and stakes for the garden beds. Peter Chauncy from McGrath Real Estate also donated \$1,000 to help get us going (good luck for the Crows Nest office, Peter). We extend our heartfelt thanks to all the above for this support.

Our launch weekend saw a few brave souls battle the worst of the winter weather to build most of one garden bed and clear and tidy much of the garden. Was it cold and wet that weekend! A big thank you to everyone who turned up and also our lovely neighbours, who have so far let us use their electricity, bins and water.

We then received some welcome help from the boys at Mills Landscapes, who completed the build and shovelled a massive pile of soil. The garden now looks like this:



The last weekend in July saw us planting some tomato seedlings, which have now been staked, and seeds for a variety of spring crops.

We have built a compost bin within the garden area and everyone is welcome to add to this. It is made of old fence palings. We also have a resident worm factory located in a donated worm farm (thanks heaps). Garden scraps can be added to the top section of this to feed the worms – instructions are on the lid.

The strawberries that were planted in winter have settled in well and now have flowers on them and fruit appearing. Here is one of our happy little plants producing fruit.

There are usually a few members gardening each Sunday from 10:00 am to noon, so please feel free to come along and join us or drop by and have a chat.

Our work over the next few months includes:

- Weeding and tending the established plantings
- Putting in trellises and small garden beds along the boundaries. These will help keep kids and balls away from the road and also provide a space for passionfruit, cucumber, squash and pumpkin
- Installing hessian sack gardens to allow us to efficiently use as much space as possible
- Extending the area under cultivation as much as possible within the confines of the site

That party was a riot!

Hmmm. That's so 1990s! But it's back again.

It seems there has been a resurgence of the scourge of teenage parents of the 1990s; the gate-crasher.

While one or two gate-crashers could possibly be tolerated, more than 15 rowdy, irresponsible teenagers turning up unannounced can make life difficult and frightening for the average party-goer and their parents.

Here are some tips for managing your teenager's party so it is a delight for all:

- Absolutely do not post anything about the party on social media sites. It takes little effort for others to figure out what is going on where.
- If possible, hire a venue, rather than have the party at home, as it is easier to manage security. The venue may also provide this.
- Let police know well in advance that a teenage party will be held.
- If you are having it at home, organise either professional security guards or neighbours and friends to man the gate and only let people in who are on an invitation list.
- Restrict access points to your home, e.g., lock the back gate.
- Have a management policy about alcohol brought by guests. This can be

the beginning of the situation getting out of hand.

- Have more than two responsible adults present. If things go wrong you often need at least two to handle the immediate situation, one to sort out the other guests and one to call for help.
- At the first sign of anything going wrong – call the police and ask for help.

Safety in units

Much of the regularly occurring crime in our area occurs in the secure parking areas of unit blocks.

The general scenario is that a thief will wait until a car enters or exits the secure area and will then slip into the parking area before the security gate closes. They will then wait until the coast is clear and break into cars and locked storage areas virtually undetected.

When they have all that they want they will wait until another entry occurs and slip out or use an external exit door.

Some patient thieves have managed to remove a large wine collection without detection.

Here are some tips for trying to prevent this from happening in your unit block - or indeed any garage or carport.

- Get to know your neighbours so that you will know who belongs and who doesn't.

- If you see strangers slipping into the car park, call the police station and ask them to check it out (9414 8499).
- Make sure your car park is well lit – preferably with motion sensitive lights.
- Paint ceilings (and every other surface if you have a chance) white as this reflects the light and makes moving shapes stand out.
- Don't keep valuable items in storage areas.
- Keep storage areas locked.
- Depending on how your individual storage area locks, it is possible to obtain portable alarms that are triggered by a door opening.
- The block should implement a policy that a resident is not to let someone standing at the security door into the building if not his/her visitor.
